Giving hope, Changing lives

Silver Spring Neighborhood Center is located in Westlawn - Wisconsin's largest public housing development - and serves more than 8,000 individuals each year. Silver Spring fulfills its mission to build a safer, stronger neighborhood and community by helping individuals and families work towards self-sufficiency.

Using a holistic approach, we guide our participants to self-sufficiency. We offer a comprehensive array of educational, health, and social services for every age and stage of life.

Elaine Schreiber Child Development Center

85 children were served in the Child Development Center

21% of children displayed developmental improvement in literacy skills

8/% of children displayed developmental improvement in social/emotional skills

Youth/Teen Programming

When S.L's mom enrolled him at the Elaine Schreiber Child Development Center last October (2018) at age 3, she expressed concerns about his speech. The Schreiber teachers assessed S.L. and not only confirmed that S.L.'s speech was delayed, but also identified cognitive concerns. Knowing that delayed speech can negatively affect a child socially and emotionally, the Schreiber staff acted guickly. With the support of S.L.'s mom, Schreiber's Family Engagement Coordinator worked through MPS's Child Find program to secure speech therapy services for S.L. In January (2019) S.L. began working with a speech therapist at Schreiber twice a week and both his teacher and his mom report that he has made significant progress and his social skills have improved.

Community Services

Two Men at Two Different Stages of Life, One Common Need... Accessible Holistic Health Care

The University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee, College of Nursing, Silver Spring Community Center Nursing Clinic, located inside the Silver Spring Neighborhood Center, provides a number of nursing and health services including outreach activities in the form of health information distribution, health care coverage screening and referral to health resources.

In October 2018, UWM Community Nursing Centers staff participated in the 2018 Fatherhood Summit which provided an opportunity to reach out to men in the community to discuss the importance of both physical and mental wellbeing. Information on health coverage needs and options for receiving care was provided to approximately 50 attendees.

One young man in his early twenties was beginning his independent life outside his parent's home. He was looking for a place to get routine care and a physical which he had not had in five years. Another man in his fifties, was starting his life over as a newly divorced father with children. He was looking for a health center to assist him in dealing with these new changes in life, in addition to getting care for his chronic conditions. Both men were able to be seen by the nurse practitioner and counseling provider from the UWM Silver Spring Community Center Nursing Clinic for their physical health and behavioral health needs. Both men reported they walked away from their experience with the nursing center staff feeling connected to a place where they felt valued, cared for and respected.

Employment Programs

Over 200 individuals received jobreadiness training

185 individuals landed full-time employment

72 participants gained certification in Community Based Residential Facilities (CBRF) and Certified Nursing Assistants (CNA)

Emergency Services

2,54/individuals received assistance more than 10,000 times through Silver Spring's Food Pantry.

868 of those people were from the 53218 zip code

Building an Educational Pipeline

Providing quality school options for the young people in our community matter now and in the future.

We are committed to building a successful educational pathway so the youth in our neighborhood have quality school options that provide the platform to compete for life sustaining work. We are working toward the goal of creating a national model for building community and supporting high academic achievement. Our partnerships with Milwaukee Public Schools, Rocketship Public Schools and Carmen Schools of Science and Technology support a pipeline for education attainment and successful matriculation from pre-primary through high school.

Browning Elementary School

Silver Spring Neighborhood Center is proud to share a building with Browning School, one of ten Milwaukee Public Schools' Community Schools where students, families, teachers, staff, neighbors, and partners all come together to create an outstanding learning environment for students. As a Community School, Browning strives to cultivate a climate and culture that enables students to develop cognitive social, emotional, physical and ethical competencies and the capacity to thrive in their college career and life.

Rocketship Transformation Prep

SSNC most recent partnership is with Rocketship Public Schools, a non-profit network of public elementary charter schools with a mission to catalyze transformative change in low-income communities through a scalable and sustainable public school model. In 2018, Rocketship Transformation Prep opened a new elementary school serving families on the northside of Milwaukee. The new school, located in SSNC for the first two years, provides an additional option for families to send their children to a high-performing elementary school in their own community.

Carmen Schools of Science and Technology, Northwest Campus

SSNC's Social Development and Opportunity Youth Programs are proud to partner with Carmen School of Science and Technology, a network of public college preparatory middle and high schools with a strong track record of success in educating and graduating central city Milwaukee students prepared to enter and succeed in college. Carmen's mission is to graduate all students as critical thinkers and self-directed learners prepared for success in college, meaningful careers, community involvement, and family life.


